Exploring the Shakuhachi: A Journey of Sound with Kojiro Umezaki

Immerse yourself in the history and sounds of the <code>shakuhachi</code> ($\mathcal{R}\Lambda$), a vertically held, end-blown bamboo flute with centuries of history. Across the ages, the shakuhachi has graced the courts as a musical instrument and accompanied monks in their meditative practices.

While not considered a mainstream musical instrument, today the shakuhachi is embraced by and actively practiced by amateurs and professionals both in- and outside of Japan. Join us for a talk and short performance by shakuhachi player, composer, and professor of music, **Kojiro Umezaki**. Umezaki will introduce this instrument's historical roots and practice as well as its role as a contributing participant in the globally evolving arena of creative music-making.



Professor Kojiro Umezaki

Noted by The New York Times as a "virtuosic, deeply expressive shakuhachi player and composer" and the LA Times as one of the "better kept secrets of Southern California music," Kojiro Umezaki (梅崎康二郎) has performed regularly

with the Silkroad Ensemble since 2001. He appears on the Grammy Award-winning album Sing Me Home, A Playlist Without Borders, Off the Map, and the Grammy-nominated 2015 documentary film, The Music of Strangers, directed by Morgan Neville. In 2014, In a Circle Records released (Cycles) — an album of Umezaki's original work — and, in 2021, he collaborated with Wu Man to create the duo album 说芳 Flow. Other notable recordings as performer, composer, and/or producer include Brooklyn Rider's Dominant Curve, Nicole Mitchell's Mandorla Awakening II, Kel Akagi's Aqua Puzzle, and Huun Huur Tu's Ancestors Call. Born to a Japanese father and a Danish mother, Umezaki grew up in Tokyo and continues to explore global and hybrid practices in music. He is currently Professor of Music at the University of California, Irvine.
